Jesus' words at the Last Supper were shocking to those in attendance. His words can seem familiar, even comforting to us because we hear these words every time, we have communion. But at their utterance, they were anything but "usual." This week we enter the scene of Jesus washing the feet of his disciples at the last meal he will share with them. Such action was enough to get a grasp of the shock that would have rippled through Jesus' friends. A "Lord" washing feet like a servant? Unbelievable! Breaking bread with the enemy? What?! But Jesus knew his end was near. And it was time for the disciples to get the message, even if it came in a shocking way: love one another as I have loved you—by serving, forgiving, freeing, communing—becoming one with—God.

## Time with the Gospel

John 13:3-16 (Jesus washes the disciple's feet)

In today's story we find ourselves at another meal, sometimes called "The Last Supper" or "The Lord's Supper." This was the meal Jesus shared with his friends on the night before he died. Let's enter the story together.

Jesus knew the time was getting close when he would leave this world. He wanted to have one last meal with the disciples. Jesus loved his friends very much and wanted to make sure that not just their stomachs were full, but their hearts as well. So, he found a special way to show his love for them.

Jesus got up from the table and tied a towel around his waist. He filled a basin with water and got on his knees. Then Jesus began washing the feet of his disciples. But when Jesus came to Peter, Peter shook his head and said, "You will never wash my feet."

Jesus said, "You don't understand what I'm doing now, but you will later."

Peter said, "Well then also wash my hands and my head."

Jesus said, "It is enough to wash your feet. You are clean."

Then Jesus said to all of them, "Do you know what I have done for you?" The disciples were all ears. Jesus continued, "You call me teacher and Lord, and that is correct. If I, your Lord, have washed your feet, you too must wash each other's." The disciples' eyes were filled with awe.

Jesus continued, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you must love one another. This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other." Jesus words had truly touched the disciples' hearts.

Thousands of churches around the world commemorate this part of the story on a special night called Maundy Thursday. "Maundy" comes from the Latin *mandatum* meaning "commandment." It is based on Jesus' words we just heard, "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you must love one another." This passage is closely linked to Jesus' humble act of washing the disciples' feet—a surprising thing for a master to do for his disciples.

#### **Dwelling in the Story - Tableau**

(A kind of "midrash" based on Washing the Feet artwork)

Dramatist: My master's banquet hall upstairs was booked for this night, and the time had arrived for this evening's group to come for the banquet. All was prepared according to their wishes, and I was ready with the water and basin as I always am. Years ago, my parents had given me to the owner as collateral for the debt they owed him. But things did not go well for them, and the debt had never been paid. And so, I work to pay it off. Roman law says that someday I could be a freed person, but I will never again have the full rights in society like those who have never been slaves. It is a mark for life. I keep my head down and do what the master asks because legally he has the right to punish, abuse, and humiliate me. I've witnessed it happen to others. Right now, I have no rights.

So, there I was with the bowl, just waiting for the go-ahead to start. It would be the honored guest first, of course, and I knew which one that was by where he was seated. This was all protocol; everyone has a place according to status. When he showed up, I recognized him and remembered the stories I had been hearing about this teacher. He was saying things that were really upsetting those invested in this system of status... saying things like "the last shall be first." My friend who serves in the kitchen had to tell me to stop staring. I just couldn't imagine a world like he described.

And then he came right up to me and took the basin of water from my hands. He took my servant's towel and wrapped it around his own waist and knelt, telling Peter to come sit down. This was going to be no ordinary night. And I realized my life, my view of myself and my station in life, was never going to be the same.
